From the Pastor's pen

I watched a fascinating documentary about insects, specifically, termites, how they live, breed, survive. I saw how countless numbers construct above-ground towers of hardened soil, many 10ft. tall lasting twenty years.

Suddenly an aardvark, in haste to feed, accidentally dug into the heart of the tower exposing the queen's quarters, then left. (Aardvarks don't purposely destroy a colony, but the mistake was made.) Exposed to light and air termite workers began the repairs in a frenzied attempt to save their queen. And they would have done it except for one thing. A scouting army ant saw the vulnerability.

This one army ant was immediately spotted by a single termite guard who initiated attack. First the army ant seemed winning, then the termite, and the struggle was pitifully real. The documenter said that the battle had larger consequences than the fight between two insects. The stakes were higher than any of us could imagine because the whole colony's existence hinged on the outcome. If the scouting army ant escaped to transmit the development, the colony would fall. If the termite won, the colony would survive.

Unfortunately, the termite was bested and soon countless thousands of army ants penetrated the cavity, overcame defenders, killed the queen, and the termite metropolis was destroyed before my astonished eyes. Breathless and spellbound, I watched the tragic, indescribable scene, all caught on camera by a lucky but amazing skillful photographer.

Later, forgetting the documentary, I Prayed, "Lord the world is so large, I am but one speck. The world is composed of so many, I am but one person..." and as I said "one person," the awful battle between two insects surfaced. And it was then I realized the significance of "the one" affecting "the many." And it was then I realized how one person may affect a family, a church, a community, for good or ill. And it was then I knew in some mysterious way those two dueling insects knew the enormity of their duty, even as I must my own.

In some respect, our Lord Jesus must have felt this struggle too, the cross on which He hung was to be the beginning of life for all those who believed.

Expanding Our Circle of Experience (and influence)

Imagine if you never left Northeastern Pennsylvania. That you never read any books about other areas, lands, or cultures, if you never saw anything beyond the borders of Lackawanna County even if only on television or films, or if no one shared pictures or movies with you on facebook or youtube of their vacation trips to other areas. Our little valley would be all that you know. While it is one of the most beautiful areas I know, there are other places just as beautiful, other cultures just as interesting. We would be missing out if we didn't leave our own little word now and again.

We live in an era when the world seems to be getting ever so much smaller. I read somewhere that there is more information available in the Sunday edition of the New York Times than the average medieval towns folk was exposed to during their entire lifetime. Yet most of us seem to be still very parochial in our view of the world or religion for that matter. I was reminded of an experience this past Sunday when Rev. Mike mentioned about the caste system in India even though the country is a democracy.

About twelve years ago the company I work for was moving to a new technology, we had a consultant who was an Indian national, his name was Kumar. He was a good friend and a big help getting us up to speed on the new technology. One evening we were working over the phone on a problem in our New York office. Kumar and I on the phone in Scranton and a person acting as our eyes and hands in New York. His name was Abraham. As time wore on, frustration with the problem was elevating on both ends of the call. At one point we were having difficulty getting our point across to Abraham. Kumar asked me to mute the phone. Kumar proceeded to tell me that Abraham must be from a certain region of India, because he didn't seem to be very smart. I had to laugh to myself since I realized that even though many of us have prejudges about folks from India, they have their own prejudges within their own county. As do Americans.

In religion and even within Christianity we have our own prejudges. But after all, in Christ we have more similarities than differences. One is not right and the other wrong. Never mind what televangelists say. After all there is only one baptism. The pastor, whether minister or priest, Methodist, Baptist, Roman Catholic or Eastern Orthodox, is only an instrument, God does the work.

As Methodists we are a product of openness of mind. In that John Wesley, an Anglican Priest was impressed by the faith of a group of Moravian Germans in prayer during a life threatening storm, while on a voyage from England to Georgia, to spread the Gospel to American Indians and during a society meeting on Aldersgate Street in London and while Martian Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans was being read, John Wesley felt his "Heart Strangely Warmed". He describes it as: "I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and the assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death." Furthermore Wesley reached back to the early fathers of the church to the Greek Patriarchs and theologians during his studies.

We have an opportunity through the Mid-Valley Ministerium to expand our experience by attending Lenten services each Wednesday during Lent. We can visit at least four different churches other than our own. Each with a slightly different response to the Gospel, but you will be amazed at the similarities.

I hope to see all who are able each Wednesday at the Lenten services in the various churches. Let the world see our Open hearts. Open minds. Open Doors. Open Hearts: That we love all, Open Minds: That we understand that not all have the same response to God's love. Open Doors: That we not only are welcoming, but that we are willing to go out into the world to find commonality with and celebrate the differences in our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Do we realize that whatever we do, where ever we go, whatever mistakes we will make in this life, his love and grace are unconditional.

Yes God's love and grace is un-merited, and unconditional, but our Heavenly Father wants us to grow in that love as a forgiven people. We cannot just say great I am loved, my sins are forgiven, and that is that. God wants us to grow in his love and grace just as Brayden will grow in the love and grace of his mom and dad.

Accepting Jesus as our Lord and Savior is a journey. It is our duty to grow in holiness of heart and life. John Wesley described it as "having the mind of Christ". John Wesley called this "perfection in love" and with God's help we should always be moving "on to perfection".

We do this by what we call the "Means of Grace" and we divide them into 2 sections:

We have the works of Piety: Prayer (private and Family), Public Worship, The Lord's Supper, Reading and studying scripture, Christian Conference and fasting or abstinence.

Next is the works of Mercy: feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, caring for the sick, visiting the jails and prisons, sheltering the homeless, welcoming the stranger, peacemaking, and acts of common good.

In order to maintain some sort of balance between the two as a Christian community we need each other. Because naturally, depending on who we are we would only chose the works that fit our personality and leave the others go. But the truth is in order to grow in God's life and grace we need to participate in both works of piety and works of mercy. To me the works of piety come so much easier than the works of mercy, it is hard for me to put myself out there but hopefully knowing it is so important to "Having the mind of Christ" will help me in the future to put myself out there more often and become better at the works of mercy.

I realize looking at this list may be overwhelming, so I invite you this Lenten season to choose a couple of them to put into practice every day, and make it a habit. I have heard it takes 21 days before something becomes a habit. Imagine at the end of Lent we will have had 40 days to grow in God's love and Grace! I wish for each of you God's Love and grace to grow abundantly this Lenten season.
